# Luke Days set for April 2 and 3

Luke Air Force Base's 56th Fighter Wing will host Luke Days April 2 and 3. The event is free and open to the public. The air show theme, "75 Years of Air Power," will mark Luke's 75th year of operation since its founding in 1941.

"Luke AFB has trained fighter pilots for every war and conflict since we were called Litchfield Park Air Base back in 1941, so it's special that we get to celebrate 75 years of service here in the West Valley with an air show," said Brig. Gen. Scott Pleus, 56th FW commander. "We're excited to open up the base to the public and showcase our mission of training the world's greatest F-35 and F-16 fighter pilots. We'll have lots of

# Luke AFB - a shining symbol of pride for Glendale and Arizona

Luke Air Force Base has and continues to be a shining symbol of pride for the city of Glendale, the West Valley, and the state of Arizona. As the world's largest fighter base, its mission is critical to the safety and security of our country.

Beyond what these brave soldiers do in protecting our nation each and every day, their contributions to our city, region and state also cannot be understated. Base operations impact our everyday economic lives, and it's easy to see why we are eager to support the men and women at Luke AFB. One of my proudest moments as a West Valley leader was hearing the news that the F-35 would be stationed here, the result of a monumental effort by Fighter Country Partnership, 91 municipalities and many others to ensure base operations well into the future.

As a former State Representative and the former Chairman of the House Military Affairs and Public Safety Committee, I gained an intimate understanding of the real impacts military installations have on our state. And now, as Mayor of Glendale, it is my honor to continue working hard towards longevity for Luke AFB, a \$2.17 billion economic engine for Arizona.

Over the years, Glendale has demonstrated its commitment by launching numerous efforts to support the base and its population of about 4,830 military members and Department of Defense civilians. Each year the base graduates more than 400 pilots and 300 air control professionals and is also the steward of the Barry M. Goldwater Range spanning more than 1.7 million acres.

Glendale has also spent millions of dollars providing the necessary infrastructure for the base, including the installation of traffic control improvements, signage upgrades and rubberized asphalt. And, "Luke Link" transit carries hundreds of daily riders to and from Glendale and the base commissary and hospital, a service maintained for almost 20 years.

Regional efforts involving public and private leadership have also proven vital in protecting and honoring the mission of Luke AFB. Glendale has led the way on many

of those. Specifically, we work closely with Fighter Country Partnership and their goal of educating and demonstrating widespread support for the base's military mission.

Luke West Valley Partners is a public sector partnership comprised of all 14 mayors and the county supervisor from the West Valley. Over the last decade we, as a group, have joined together to fund consultant reports and to lobby various agencies to protect the mission of the base and secure additional missions, such as the F-35. We meet regularly and work together to develop strategies and policies to ensure compatibility, and we have visited the Pentagon to meet with our national military leaders on a yearly basis to advocate for the ongoing mission of the base.

It is also my honor to serve on the Luke West Valley Council. Established in the mid 1980's, the Council is comprise of: Luke AFB Officials, elected officials from all West Valley cities and

Maricopa County, and representatives from Sun City and Sun City West. This group's purpose is to discuss and address community issues, challenges and successes relating to Luke AFB activities, to maintain and ensure future support for the base and to recognize the critically important role the base plays in our community. Legislators and other organizations frequently attend these meetings as well.

In the late 1980s and again from 2000 to 2005, West Valley leaders secured significant statewide legislation to ensure responsible land use planning around military airports. Today's laws have established compatible land uses and protections within noise contours and accident potential zones around the base. All of these efforts reflect the tremendous commitment that state, local and community leaders have in protecting military installations statewide from residential encroachment.

in the U.S. Air Force, it's also important to bear in mind that Arizona is a global leader in aerospace and defense. With about 1,200 A&D companies employing 52,000 people, our state ranks third in the country when it comes to the supply chain. This creates a ripple effect on the economies of our city, region and state. Consider the impact of all of those employees—their homes, car purchases, and retail impact. It truly matters for Glendale and the entire state. Here in Glendale, for example, Honeywell employs more than 800 people with high-paying jobs. In addition, there are about 70,000 retired military members living in the Valley.

We have a long and steadfast tradition of strength.

Following World War II, defense industry production and manufacturing companies moved from the West and East coasts and found new homes inland. With 300 days of sunshine and cloudless skies, Arizona earned a lion's share of those jobs and employers. Decades later, the aerospace and military-related industries in Arizona continue to be a critical platform of our state's economic engine.


Already, the F-35 training mission is serving as an economic stimulus for our Valley's construction industry, as \$100-\$125 million in infrastructure upgrades continue to be made with the F-35 aircraft's arrival. This ramping-up period is resulting in about 3,000 construction jobs.



# Luke Air Force Base—the best of the West Valley

Some 10 years ago, I was a somewhat reluctant transplant from Illinois. My wife, an Arizona native, had just gone through a serious illness and we decided to move her back home to Arizona so she could be close to her family.

Going from the cornfields and forests of Illinois to the Sonoran desert of the Valley of the Sun was, in many ways, a jarring experience. The visual contrast between lush verdancy and the pastels and creams of the desert landscape was intense. Early on, in my first summer, I learned about the dangers of steering wheels and heat conductivity.

But as we settled into our new home, I fell in love with the West Valley with all its many and varied attributes and amenities. Chief among them is Luke Air Force Base.

Luke AFB, as I quickly learned, is of vital importance, not only to the region, but also to the state and the nation. Luke AFB contributes in excess of \$2 billion annually to the Arizona economy and is one of the largest employers in the state.

Luke began as a 1,440 acre land lease from the City of Phoenix to the Army Air Corps in 1941 and was first known as Litchfield Park Air Base.

Later that same

year, it was renamed Luke Field in honor of Frank Luke Jr., a WWI flying ace and the first aviator awarded the Medal of Honor. (The award was posthumous since Frank Luke Jr. was

killed in action Sept. 29, 1918, at age 21, after his 200 hp SPAD XIII bi-plane was shot down near Murvaux, France).

The United States Air Force became a separate military service Sept. 18, 1947 and, after a five-year deactivation between WWII and the Korean War, Luke Field was reactivated and officially named Luke Air Force Base.

Some 12,000 pilots were trained at Luke Field during WWII and over the

years, in excess of 55,000 fighter pilots have been trained at Luke AFB. In modern times, the vast majority of Middle-Eastern-Theatre pilots have been trained at Luke AFB. With its desert location and close proximity to the Barry M. Goldwater Bombing Range, it is an ideal training facility for this country's current military missions.

In August 2012, the Air Force announced the selection of Luke AFB as a pilot training center for the new Joint Strike Fighter, or F-35, program. The F-35 is an exportable '5th generation' fighter and is the product of a partnership of nine countries: the United States, Australia, Canada, Denmark, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway, Turkey and the United Kingdom.

This announcement


was the culmination of an arduous, yearslong, unprecedented cooperative marketing effort, which saw every municipality in the West Valley along with Maricopa County, the State of Arizona and many of the region's major employers come together, as partners, to petition and lobby the Air Force to place this critical mission at


Luke AFB. Local, county and state leaders have worked hard, for decades, defending Luke from the BRAC process (Base Closure and Realignment Commission) of the 1990s and developmental encroachment of the early 2000s. This unprecedented support and co-operation has assured that Luke AFB will be able to fulfill its daily flight missions and remain an integral part of the West Valley well into the future.

As I travel throughout the West Valley, fighter jets are a ubiquitous presence in our desert skies. military friendly schools complete a survey of questions related to military support on campus, graduation and employment outcomes, and military spouse policies. Survey responses are then scored against benchmarks against these key indicators of success and independently tested by Ernst & Young based upon the weightings and methodology established by Victory Media with guidance from an independent advisory board of higher education and recruiting professionals.

## **Maricopa Community College District launches Veterans Success Project**

The Maricopa Community Colleges and pre-enrollment advisement; system plans to create a statewide program to provide support to military personnel, veterans and their families as they move from active duty to civilian life. The program, which takes a holistic approach to helping veterans and families identify and reach education, career, and life goals, will begin once the Maricopa Community Colleges Foundation raises the \$14 million to support the initiative.

The new program will build on Maricopa's successful record in providing education to veterans through, for example, its East Valley Veterans Education Center in Tempe, which is supported by several Maricopa Community Colleges and led by Rio Salado College.

The new Veterans Success Project proposes creation of a similar center in the West Valley that will be a regional hub, where veterans and their families will receive a variety of support under one roof.

"No matter where veterans live in metro Phoenix, they will be able to find services to provide satellite support services to vetand educational support at one of the Veterans Educational Centers or one of our 12 campus Vet Centers," said Maricopa Chancellor Rufus Glasper. "This new project will allow us to provide more effective pathways for veterans to reach their career goals."

Other proposed items – all dependent on raising funds to support them – include:

 A prototype for a centralized District and State Application for Veterans Aid database that would allow electronic submission, processing and tracking of veteran aid Services, at 480-731-8824.

- A centralized location for student referrals to be entered and tracked and customer satisfaction to be recorded;
- A center for curriculum evaluation and transfer model for military credits. Among other things, military courses will be checked against courses and skills at Arizona's colleges and universities;
- · Faculty and staff training to raise awareness about such veteran issues as post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury;
- A veterans Career Re-entry job placement and referral center in collaboration with local business and industry;
- A district contact and resolution center to help veterans transition into the Maricopa Community Colleges as well as link veterans to critical community-based support
- Veterans success courses specifically oriented to the needs of veterans; and
- Expansion of existing veterans centers erans, active-duty Guard, reserve military members, and their families.

The proposal calls for the district to work closely with community organizations supporting veterans. A key goal is to provide a seamless transfer process for veterans interested in completing a baccalaureate degree.

## Luke Family Advocacy Center and Glendale PD earn international honor

The International Association of Chiefs of Police and the American Military University presented a certificate of honor Oct. 25 in Chicago to the Glendale Police Department and the Luke Family Advocacy Center for their joint efforts in providing support for victims of domestic abuse.

The award, which was accepted by the Glendale PD and then handed to members of the Luke FAC in a second ceremony Nov. 5, highlights the cooperation between the officers and detectives of the Glendale Family Advocacy Center and the office of the Domestic Abuse Victim Advocate here at Luke in providing resources to care for and protect militaryrelated victims of domestic violence and abuse.

"Domestic violence is often seriously traumatizing and the end result can be deadly," said Capt. Sonja Raciti, 56th Medical Operations Squadron family advocacy officer. "We've seen so many victims who have passed away because they remained trapped in violent situations with their abusers and could not figure out how to escape."

The Luke DAVA and Glendale Family Advocacy Center are able to assist victims by guiding them through legal procedures and providing them with resources such as shelter, transportation, and child-care in order to allow the victim and their family to live independently of their abuser.

"Having someone who can walk them through the legal processes and hold their hand to let them know there really is a light at the end of the tunnel is essential," Raciti said.

Additionally, partnership with the Glendale Police Department allows the FAC to more easily direct victims through the process of obtaining restraining and protection orders against aggressors.

"If the victim's abuser

continues to pursue them, text them, call them, or threaten or intimidate them, there is protection that the police can offer and we can help the victim get that." The cooperative efforts of the two advocacies as defined by their Memorandum of Understanding, a formal agreement of partnership between Luke and the Glendale Police. is resulting in an effect reaching far beyond the local Phoenix community.

"We are looking at creating a like MOU for Air Force installations throughout the Air Force enterprise to be able to utilize, and are interested in how [Luke] chose to structure [theirs]," said David Thomas, senior advisor for the Sexual Assault Prevention Response Office at the Pentagon.

"Our higher-ups are really looking at how we work with civilian law enforcement here, and are acknowledging that this is something we should have Air Force-wide," Raciti said.

The advocacies are hopeful the impact their collective work has created will continue to help victims for the foreseeable future.

"We enjoy the great partnership we have between Luke and the City of Glendale, and this award is just a reflection of how, when we work together, we create a better community and better services for the people who serve our country at all levels," Glendale Police Chief Debora Black said. "Our MOU establishes our partnership for five years, but I know our cooperation will go far beyond that."





# Two Arizona cadets earn Civil Air Patrol's highest award

Spaatz Award is Civil Air Patrol's highest cadet honor. It is presented to cadets who have demonstrated excellence in leadership, character, fitness, and aerospace education. Cadets Meghan and Jessica Parsons received the award in late October 2015. This granted them the grade of Cadet Colonel.

Cadets qualify for this prestigious award after devoting an average of five years to progress through 16 achievements in the CAP Cadet Program. Meghan and Jessica completed the program in only four years. Along the way cadets develop selfdiscipline, a strong sense of personal responsibility, the ability to lead and the foundation necessary for pursuing a career in aviation, space, or technology. Cadets also learn a great deal about leadership that will benefit them in a career in any industry.

The final step a cadet must complete to earn the Spaatz Award is a rigorous four-part exam consisting of a challenging physical

The General Carl A. fitness test, an essay exam testing their moral reasoning, a comprehensive written exam on leadership, and a comprehensive written exam on aerospace education. Upon passing the Spaatz Award exams, the cadet is promoted to the grade of Cadet Colonel.

In the past four years, they have worked together towards the Spaatz Award, supporting each other. # From cockpit to classroom, fighter pilot is legendary

Skip Hopler was one of the first to fly the F-16 Fighting Falcon. Now, he's guiding the launch of F-35 Lightning II operations by training the next generation.

Skip Hopler is born to fly. With 3,800 hours in the cockpit as a U.S. Air Force pilot, his love of flying began at an early age like many pilots, and he was inspired by his uncle's stories from World War II, flying missions over Europe. What Hopler didn't know until later in his career is that he is born to teach, too.

Hopler has trained more than a thousand pilots during his military service and then as a contract ground training instructor pilot. In his current role, Hopler is responsible for training the next generation of fighter pilots as the lead for the F-35 Academic Training Center at Luke Air Force

"What makes a great fighter pilot is attitude, skills and training," Hopler said. "The pilots we're training today at Luke are outstanding, and my

Hopler brings operational experience from 21 years of service in the Air Force to his role on the F-35. After F-4 pilot training at Moody Air Force Base in Georgia, he deployed twice to Southeast Asia

team's job is to give each and flew 389 missions in just two years during the Vietnam Conflict.

> He also flew Hawker Hunters with the U.K.'s Royal Air Force as part of a tactical weapons unit, before he was selected to join the initial cadre of F-16 pilots. That's when Hopler found his second passion



- teaching. In 1978, Hopler helped stand up the first F-16 squadron at Hill Air Force Base in Utah and then continued his career as an F-16 instructor pi-

He said making the jump to the F-35 has been similar to the transition to other new aircraft, except that the avionics and weapons are significantly more sophisticated.

"Aviation technology evolves, and the F-35 introduces the opportunity to advance tactics, but the objective to be the best fighter pilot you can be never changes. I see the same drive in the F-35 pilots we're training today,"

As the F-35A pilot training hub, Luke Air Force Base will eventually provide training for U.S. pilots, plus seven partner nations and house a total of 144 F-35s. The base welcomed its first class in May 2015. Since then, 14 pilots have graduated through the F-35 Training System at Luke.

Pilots begin their F-35 training with Hopler's team at the Academic Training Center with classroom instruction and flights in the Full Mission Simulator, which replicates all aircraft sensors and weapons employment. Simulator flights are a major component of F-35 training to prepare pilots for their first ride in the single-seat F-35. More than half of the initial qualification flights for the F-35 take place in the Full Mission Simulator for training effectiveness and affordability.

The F-35 technology is impressive, Hopler said, but the technology alone isn't the advantage. It's the men and women equipped to use it - with the right attitude, skills and training - that make all the difference.

"Here at Luke, we're preparing the pilots who provide a security net for our country and coalition partners," Hopler said. "Many pilots have gone before them, and our team is honored to continue the legacy and train the world's best fighter pilots."



# O-Negative LAFB blood donors are special heroes to Arizona patients

As the temperatures cool down in our state, Arizona's population rises with the influx of winter visitors. Along with this growth comes a greater need for blood donors. The cold and flu season often further impacts the need for blood when many regular donors can't give due to illness. Having an ample supply of Type O blood is especially important this time of year, because it gives doctors transfusion options when

shortages of other blood types arise.

O-Negative: 6 percent of the population has it; 100 percent of patients can receive it. The universal donor, O-negative is the only blood that can be substituted for all other types. In emergency situations when there is no time to determine a patient's blood type, doctors depend on Onegative blood to sustain life until the patient can be stabilized. Having plenty

of O-negative available to hospitals is important because doctors routinely rely on O-negative blood when premature babies and infants under six months old require lifesaving transfusions. A typical 6-pound newborn has only about 8 ounces (one cup) of blood and extremely tiny veins, making it difficult to conduct blood tests. Furthermore, because of their immature immune systems, neonates often lack the necessary

factors to easily determine blood type. O-negative is the only blood type these babies

can safely receive.

"My son, Dean, was severely anemic when he was born and needed a blood transfusion right away,"

said Twila.

Dean was later diagnosed with a rare condition called Diamond Blackfan Anemia. His body did not produce enough red blood cells to carry oxygen throughout his body, so he relied on red blood cell transfusions to live normally.

"Dean is type O-negative, and we have waited several hours to get a transfusion that is a match for him," Twila explained, "It is humbling to realize that my son's life is dependent upon other people donating blood. Every blood donor is a true hero to Dean."




